<u>Bin 3</u> is for sweatshirts, jackets, and coats, especially with hoods. All previously donated clothes were taken to Haven for Hope.

Once toiletry articles are collected, more giveaway bags can be assembled.

Pray for all poor and neglected people whom it would be easy for us to forget: the homeless and the destitute, the old and the sick, and all who are broken in body or spirit. Turn their sorrow into joy.

Special Days/Events

- August 1—Feast Day of Joseph of Arimathea.
- August 6—International Day "Physicians of the World for Peace." This date was chosen to commemorate the atomic bombing of Hiroshima in 1945, serving as a reminder of the devastating consequences of war and the critical role physicians play in advocating for peace and preventing future conflicts.
- ◆ August 7—Celebrating John Mason Neale. A priest of many talents, contributing six original hymns, and more than thirty translations of Latin and Greek hymns to the *Hymnal 1940*. As a priest, he gave active support to the Oxford Movement in its revival of medieval liturgical forms. As a humanitarian, he founded the Sisterhood of St. Margaret for the relief of suffering women and girls. (Source: *Lesser Feasts and Fasts*)
- August 14—Celebrating Jonathan Myrick Daniels. As a civil rights activist and Episcopal seminarian, Jonathan Daniels lost his life shielding a teen from a sheriff's gunfire. He chose the sacrificial servant path. And the teen? She went on to preach the gospel through her non-violent advocacy of human and civil rights.
- August 18—Feast Day of Artemisia Bowden. A humanitarian, educator, Christian, leader, advocate, and fundraiser. Dr. Artemisia Bowden was called to the Episcopal Diocese of West Texas by the Rt. Rev. James S. Johnston, Second Bishop of West Texas, to lead and develop a local school for women. Under decades of her faithful leadership it grew and developed into today's St. Philip's College, a strong part of the Alamo Colleges District in San Antonio. - August 30—International Day of the Disappeared. An observance dedicated to raising awareness about the global issue of enforced disappearances, where individuals are secretly abducted or imprisoned by state authorities or other groups, and their whereabouts are kept unknown. This day focuses on the plight of those who have disappeared, the suffering of their families, and the need for justice and accountability. - August 31—The Beheading of John the Baptizer.

A Message From Our Bishops Diocesan Response to Hill Country Flood

Dear Family of West Texas,

Grace to you and Peace. We write to you today to give you an update on the tragic flooding which struck the Texas Hill Country on July 4, and the on-going response of the Diocese of West Texas.

As you know from continuing news coverage, search teams continue to comb the riverbanks and debris piles for those who are missing. Almost daily we hear announcements that more of the lost have been found. Yet, the number of those still missing staggers our imaginations.

Several congregations in West Texas have lost members of their extended church families. St. Peter's in Kerrville has lost at least seven parishioners. Christ Church in San Antonio buried a husband and wife this week. The Rev. Robert McAllen (Ret.) and his wife Margaret, who reside in Weslaco, lost their grandson. St. David's School in San Antonio lost a former student. This tragedy has revealed the web of relationships that connects congregations, schools, camp communities, and extended families. These connections reach across our diocese and beyond to adjoining dioceses and adjoining states. So many in our congregations have lost a home, or a loved one, or know someone who has.

Our connectedness as members of the Body of Christ is a gift from God. We wish you could read all the messages of love, prayer, financial contributions and support we have received: From our Presiding Bishop and leaders in the Anglican Communion; from bishops, priests and deacons around the country; from altar guilds and Sunday Schools; from vestries and Bishop's Committees inside and outside West Texas. We are reminded that we are surrounded by the great Communion of Saints. Our hearts are lifted by their love and generosity, and their prayers are tangibly felt.

The Diocese of West Texas is responding directly and strategically to the needs in the Kerrville, Hunt and Ingram area. We have centered our efforts at St. Peter's Church, Kerrville and are in daily communication with their clergy and lay leaders. St. Peter's has added staff and volunteers to organize relief and recovery efforts. A RV has been purchased by the diocese to create a satellite location in Hunt for worship, pastoral care, counseling of search teams, and ministry support. Shipping containers have been purchased to store donated supplies. With help from diocesan staff, St. Peter's hosted a community VBS for 90 children this week. Short-term and long-term plans are being made for grief counseling and mental health support for children, families and first responders.

We are deeply grateful for the outpouring of generous financial contributions by congregations and individuals. Today, Bishop Cortiñas delivered a \$200,000 check to St. Peter's to support recovery efforts. The diocese has also received a \$24,000 grant

from Episcopal Relief and Development to meet the immediate needs of those impacted by the flooding.

At this time, St. Peter's is not collecting donated items like clothing, water, and cleaning supplies. The city has more than it needs. The best thing you can do to help is to continue to pray, and to make financial contributions. In the weeks and months ahead there will be other needs and a need for volunteers. St. Peter's has created a website to register those who wish to volunteer, and to share information about recovery efforts. You may find it at www.stpeterskerrville.com/floodrelief. The Diocese of West Texas continues to invite and receive financial contributions. One of the post-communion prayers we say together in worship reminds us that in Christ we are members of the "mystical body of thy Son, the blessed company of all faithful people; and are also heirs through hope" of the everlasting kingdom of our God who assists us daily with God's grace. (BCP p. 339). We thank you for your outpouring of prayers and generosity and ask for your continued prayers for the families of the missing, those who mourn, those who have lost homes and livelihoods, and for the clergy and people of St. Peter's Church as we continue this journey of recovery knowing Jesus, our Good Shepherd, is with us.

"The next General Convention, in 1976, adopted resolutions stating that "homosexual persons are children of God who have a full and equal claim with all other persons upon the love, acceptance, and pastoral concern and care of the Church" (1976-A069), and that they "are entitled to equal protection of the laws with all other citizens" (1976-A071).

In 2026 the Episcopal Church will celebrate the 50th anniversary of the 1976 resolution at General Convention. The work continues today as we remember the struggles, the joy, and strength of our LGBTQ+ siblings in Christ. Learn more <u>here</u>.

On Flag Day, June 14, All Saints, San Benito fed more than 100 first responders from across the county including EMTs, law enforcement, and fire fighters.

From the San Benito News "The congregation and everyone came together," said Church Vicar Stepheya George, standing near multiple tables where dozens of sack lunches sat ready for the grabbing. "We started yesterday and finished today." Dominguez later stated that participation exceeded expectations, as the church scrambled to purchase additional supplies to feed the growing number of first responders.
